





Registering to vote



You need to register to be able to vote in an election.

- Registering to vote online (at www.gov.uk/registertovote) is the easiest and quickest way.
- All you need is your national insurance number and date of birth
- If you're unable to register online, you can register by post
- Forms are available on our website/ your local electoral registrations office
- You only need to register once, unless you change your address, name or nationality
- Registration deadline is midnight on April 19

Eligibility



You can vote in the Senedd election if you are registered to vote in Wales, will be 16 years old or over on Thursday 6 May, and are:

- a British or Irish citizen, or
- a Commonwealth citizen who has leave to remain in the UK or does not require leave to remain in the UK, or
- a citizen of a European Union country, or
- a qualifying foreign citizen, who has permission to enter or stay in the UK, or who does not need such permission

How to vote



There are three different ways you can vote:

- 1. In person at the polling station
- 2. By post
- 3. Asking someone you trust to vote on your behalf (by proxy)
- Before polling day voters receive a poll card. It tells you where and when you can vote.
- Unless you've arranged otherwise, it will be assumed that you want to vote in person.
- You don't need to take your poll card with you to the polling station.
